"Fundamental Rights in Hungary and the European Values"

The presentation deals with recent deviations from the shared European values of fundamental rights in Hungary. The starting point of deviation is Article 2 TEU, which demands "respect for human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, rule of law and [...] human rights including the rights of minorities", many of which are violated by Hungary as Member State of both the Council of Europe and the European Union. The presentation investigates these violations through various judgments of European Court of Human Rights and the European Court of Justice, as well as through infringement actions against Hungary regarding fundamental rights since 2010. The presentation investigates the impact of those tools of European institutions in order to be able to assess the effectiveness of European institutions to enforce compliance with core European values regarding fundamental rights.



Gábor Halmai, professor of law, is the chair of of Constitutional Law at the European University Institute in Florence. His primary research interests are comparative constitutional law, and international human rights. He has published several books and articles, as well as edited volumes on these topics in English, German and Hungarian. His most recent book, "Perspectives on Global Constitutionalism" deals with the use of foreign and international law by domestic courts (published by Eleven International Publishing in 2014). He joined the EUI in 2016 after a teaching and research career (at the Eötvös Loránd University in Hungary, at the Princeton University in the US, at the European Masters Program in Human Rights and Democratization in Italy) as well as years of professional career as chief advisor to the President of the Hungarian Constitutional Court, member of the EU Fundamental Rights Agency's Management Board and numerous other civic activities.
